Peacekeeping Training Roles and Responsibilities

Responsibilities laid down by GA Res 49/37 (1994)

Integrated Training Service, DPO

 Provides Member States and missions with training materials and standards which match operational requirements. Delivered mostly through training of trainer programmes.

Troop-contributing Countries (TCCs)

- Commit to provide well-trained and well-equipped uniformed personnel and to support the effective development and delivery of peacekeeping training
- Commit to support pre-deployment preparations of personnel and capabilities required for effective performance, and the existing human rights screening policy

Missions and Military Components

 Ensure all newly arrived contingents and individually deployed personnel receive mission-specific induction training, and in-mission exercises to adequately respond to the Mission's operational, performance and safety and security requirements and needs



Peacekeeping Training Roles and Responsibilities

Integrated Training Service (ITS)

Role of ITS


- To provide an integrated capacity to develop and disseminate guidance, standards and training material to Member States and field missions.
- To support the pre-deployment, induction and in-mission training of peacekeepers.

Goal

 To support strengthened and sustained performance by standardized and consistent training for uniformed and civilian leaders, contingents and individuals.



Role of ITS: Support to Member States





- Once contingents deployed, ITS conducts military, police, civilian-specific mission induction training
- Current programmes under review
- New materials to be rolled out in July 2023





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Responsibilities of Member States

• Prior to deployment:

 All T/PCCs require to certify that they are trained, screened, equipped, and exercised, to meet the Mission mandate (Operational Readiness Policy)

- AAVs, PDVs, PRVs: the opportunity to verify PDT

After deployment, FCs and PCs must:

- Conduct in-mission training incl. on Conduct and Discipline/SEA, by U7/G7 (Training Section/ Cell)
- Conduct annual exercises
- Monitor and evaluate the contingent performance



Responsibilities of Member States

Exercise requirement

- Exercises practice procedures and build resilience.
- Annual Table-Top Exercises (TTX) and Command Post Exercises (CPX) required
- Training of Trainers for CPX and TTX available through ITS and OMA





1. Ensuring common understanding of training and standards

- Military STMs, 2022-23
 - STM for National Investigation Officers
 - STM for UN Infantry Battalions
 - RTP for UN Operational Logistics
 - RTP for UN Peacekeeping-Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance
 - RTP on the UN Engagement Platoon.
 - New All Arms Search Course by UNMAS & ITS
- Police STMs, 2022-23
 - STM for UN Police Officers
 - 7 job-specific courses
- In-Mission
 - CPX programme delivered with MS support
 - ITS scenario-based exercises
 - Uniformed specific induction training





2. Performance, incl. training support

ITS in Monthly Integrated Performance meetings with UCSD, CDS, OMA, PD, DPET

- Training/Capacity building support/facilitation is one of the measures used to enhance performance:
 - Deployment of ITS-provided MTTs
 - Identification of a training/capacity-building partner via LCM
 - Deployment of a mixed team: e.g., coordination of training providers for a TCC.





2. Performance, incl. leadership role in performance

- ITS Senior Mission Leaders
 - 2 courses in 2022 (Côte d'Ivoire, March / Sweden, June)
 - 2 planned in 2023, incl. 1 in French.
- With OMA: FC, Sector Commander, Infantry Battalion Commander courses
- With PD: UNPCC and FPU Commander courses



 ITS/DOS roll-out of Enhanced Training for High level Operational Support (ETHOS) for P-4/P-5 staff, focused on admin and operational support.



2. Performance and capacity-building: Strengthening engagement with national, regional and international PK centers

- ITS supports partnerships between T/PCCs
 - In 2022: **22** MS offered seats to other T/PCCs at their national/regional training centers
 - ITS circulated these offers for courses that have TR
- ITS partners with MS for the development and delivery of training courses/exercises
 - Critical as Support Account training funds decline vs. increasing operational requirements for largest/most difficult missions and deploying T/PCCs
 - E.g., 2022-2023: MS partnership for the delivery of CPX in Missions, multi-year XB project to support African peacekeeping capacity, review of UNSO, development of e-CPTM (2023-24), translations of training materials (XB/in-kind)
- ITS partners with MS for <u>all</u> leadership training (XB/in-kind)
 - E.g., 2022-2023: SML, UN PCC and FPU Commander courses



- 3. Safety and Security: Peacekeeping-Intelligence in PDT
- ITS TOT roll-out of the RTP for MPKI developed with OMA:
 - Kenya, Dec 2021 (24 participants from 11MS)
 - Kenya, April 2022 (17 participants from 7 MS)
 - Austria, May 2022 (15 participants from 11 MS)
 - Kenya, Nov 2022 (23 participants from 10 MS)
 - Bangladesh, Nov 2022 (15 participants from 4 MS)
 - Kazakhstan, 1-12 May 2023
- ITS supported and certified Kenyan UNMPKI course, in Nov 2022





- 3. Safety and Security: FP and First-aid training
- ITS RTP on Force Protection development with 4 PCCs and 11 TCCs
 - Expected release by 2nd semester 2023
 - Address security/defense gaps
 - Strengthens existing STMs for military units and FPUs
- Health, Basic 1st Aid, and Medical training:
 - Now a Member State responsibility
 - UN supports when needed. e.g., LCM facilitated bilateral and triangular partnership initiatives for Buddy 1st Aid Kits (BFAC) to TCCs; 1st Aid training courses in the country; coordination of capacity building providers.





3. Safety and Security: IED threat mitigation training

IED Threat mitigation: DPO continue to improve TCC preparedness for operating within high threat IED environments by:

- Immediate term: UNMAS in-mission training and mentorship of TCCs in threat awareness, convoy planning, search & detect, and IED disposal. MS providing support.
- Longer term: UNMAS mobile teams providing technical guidance to regional/national training centres for TCCs in high IED threat areas to obtain UN TR for courses (e.g., TR for EOD/IEDD Course Kenya and EOD Kazakhstan)
- UNMAS support to alignment of the upstream elements of force generation through technical guidance to AAVs, military skills validations, and PDVs
- UNMAS support OMA's current effort in developing a draft PK counter-explosive ordnance strategy.



- 4. Enhancing meaningful participation of women
- Support the promotion of women to senior leadership positions in missions
 - 50% women attendance at the 2022 Senior Mission Leaders course (March, Côte d'Ivoire)
- Accelerate institutionalization of female/mixed engagement teams through training
 - ITS / OMA / OHCHR + 13 MS developed UN Engagement Platoon training material. Supplement to STM UNIBAT. Used PDT and in-mission training.




4. Enhancing meaningful participation of women

- ✓ Increased targeted training/CB for women in uniformed components
 - ITS push for nomination by MS of qualified female participants for all training courses:
 - 2017-18: 12% --> 2022: 26% = **50% increase over 5 years**
 - 50% women participants at the UNMO STM TOT in Nigeria (June) -ITS/OMA/GPOI
 - In 2022, all ITS-deployed mobile training teams were composed of at least one woman.



4. Enhancing meaningful participation of women

ITS training 2022: Numbers of T/PCCs and participants



26 per cent of trainees were women



4. Enhancing meaningful participation of women

Guidelines and training modules for uniformed gender advisers, and reviewed/ strengthened PDT on WPS issues for troops, police and corrections personnel

- Completion of OMA revision of the DPO Guidelines:" Integrating a gender perspective"
 - Guide FHQ, Contingent Commanders and TCCs to implement WPS agenda
- Military Gender Adviser (MGA) course, by OMA, ITS and UNITAR:
 - phase 1, online (completed) and Phase 2, in-person (final development, ToT in Morocco/June 2022); expected release in 2023.
 - Strengthens capacities of MGA and Military Gender Focal Points to integrate gender perspective into all areas of work.
- Case Study Handbook on Gender, Peace and Security (CSHB-GPS):
 - Incorporates gender-responsive considerations for commanders and troops. Expected release 2023.
- Recruitment process of uniformed personnel: OMA/FGS verification of mandatory training completion before deployment, during AAVs, PRVs and PDVs.



5. Supporting implementation of appropriate technology

In order to:

- Enhance situational awareness
- Build peacekeeping data systems and encourage use of technology
- Boost uniformed safety and security
- Recognize Member States as an integral actor
- Level the playing field by supporting T/PCCs



5. Supporting implementation of appropriate technology

Current baseline in peace operations and T/PCCs:

- Member States different levels of use and access to digital technologies: bandwidth; data storage; mismatched requirements and access.
- For example, Uruguay deploys micro-UAVs and C-IED jammers; Viet Nam deploys short range UAVs; Ghana plans to deploy drones; and Germany deploy mobile apps for background checks.
- Peacekeeping training centres have varying levels of access and use of technology ranging from computers to simulation software.





5. Supporting implementation of appropriate technology

Training Needs Assessment

- A better understanding of the capacities is needed.
- A TNA may be conducted in phase two of the Leveraging Technology Project.

Light Coordination Mechanism

- LCM survey can include digital technologies needs and gaps of T/PCCs
- Survey summer 2023





5. Supporting implementation of appropriate technology

Doctrine, training, equipment

- Standard setting to be in conjunction with T/PCCs
- Training capacity is required to level the playing field
 - Strengthen technological awareness
 - Equip T/PCCs with digital tools
 - Develop requisite digital training
 - Utilize data driven tools to analyze and prioritize threats
 - Provide appropriate technological solutions
- Contingent-owned equipment vs. UN-owned equipment





Suggestions for AAPTC Members

- Keep up to date on new policies, requirements and STMs (Peacekeeping Resource Hub: <u>https://peacekeepingresourcehub.un.org</u> and other websites)
- Focus on the basics core professional skills before adding the complexity of UN peacekeeping
- Train those who deploy and only deploy trained personnel (UN PDT is mandatory)
- Commanders need the right mindset
- Provide equal career opportunities to women training, roles & deployments
- Provide funding and other support for ITS work: SME support for the development of new STMs, funding for the translation of materials, hosting of pilot workshops and TOTs, supporting new and emerging T/PCCs through LCM, etc.



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
